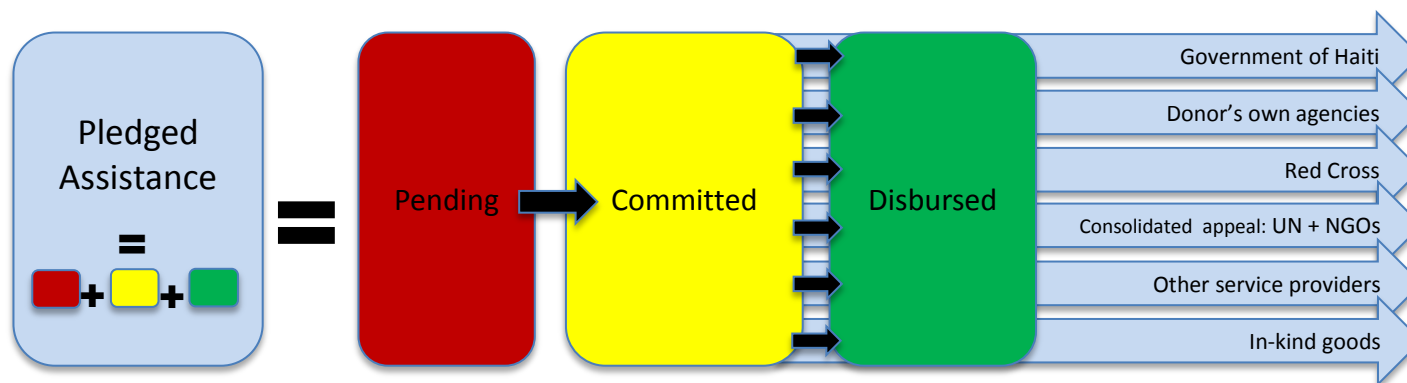

(3) Committed (or obligated) funds are those for which projects have been approved or agreements/contracts have been signed or are in the process of being transferred/dispensed. Committed funds are exclusive of disbursed funds.

(4) Disbursed funds are those that have been transferred to an implementing partner (e.g., the Government of Haiti, an NGO or other non-state service provider).

(5) The flash appeal is a consolidated appeal for funding coordinated by the Office for Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs. The flash appeal requested \$1.502 billion for 2010, of which it had received \$1.108 billion by 31 December 2010. \$748.7 million was received from the donors above, and the remaining \$359.3 million was received from private funding and other donors from their recovery pledges made at the March 31 donors conference in New York. That is, some donors, such as Japan and Ireland, have also contributed to flash appeal projects through their recovery pledges. These contributions are not listed above. (6) Includes UN agencies, NGOs or other contracting agencies.

(7) Funds from the United States government recorded as being committed have been obligated. This means that the funds are guaranteed to the implementing partner which can begin implementation.

(8) The source for these donors (OCHA, Saudi Arabia, Morocco and "other") is the Financial Tracking Service (FTS) managed by the Office for Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA). The UK data is based on a combination of data received from the donor and from FTS.
