(2) This analysis includes the top 30 donors from the New York donors conference based on the total pledge. Donors in *italics are part of the top 30 but* have been excluded from this analysis as they are yet to allocate a budget to 2010 (Argentina, InterAction, Kuwait and Qatar) and / or are yet to allocate a budget to 2010 and 2011 (International Federation of the Red Cross and UNASUR).

(3) This analysis is based on the 2010 calendar year. Donors used different fiscal years to make their pledges, as listed on the OSE website. Most donors used the calendar year (1 January - 31 December). Five donors, the Australia (30 June), Canada (31 March), IMF (30 September), Japan (31 March) and the US (30 September), used different fiscal years. The Office of the Special Envoy has attempted to harmonize donor pledges based on the calendar year.

(4) Donors may commit funds in 2010 that are part of their allocation to future years. For example, a \$40 million grant may be disbursed in \$20 million transfers over 2 years. Thus the sum of the committed and the disbursed amounts may be greater than the 2010 allocation.

(5) Committed (or obligated) funds are those for which projects have been approved or agreements/contracts have been signed or are in the process of being transferred/dispensed. Funds that have been committed and disbursed are accounted as being disbursed only.

(6) Disbursed funds are those that have been transferred to an implementing partner (e.g., the Government of Haiti, an NGO or other non-state service provider).

(7) Canada, CDB, the European Commission, France, the IDB, Spain, Sweden and the US have other funding sources to contribute to the recovery efforts (funding in addition to their New York pledge and exclusive of their humanitarian funding).

(8) The International Federation of the Red Cross (IFRC) and national Red Cross societies raised approximately \$816 million in private funds for the Haiti response, of which \$320 million was pledged to recovery at the New York donors conference and \$396 million was allocated to relief. The Red Cross reported in June 2010 that of the \$235.03 million of the \$816 million in private funds for relief and recovery had been disbursed.

InterAction's members (excluding the American Red Cross, which is also included in the IFRC's pledge) raised over \$795 million in private funds for the Haiti response, of which \$321.8 million was pledged to recovery at the New York donors conference, and \$473.2 million was allocated as relief and. Approximately 38 InterAction members reported on their expenditure of private funds in the Haiti Accountability Report (HAR) published in July 2010. Most of the figures in the HAR are from the three-month mark. These 38 members had received \$514 million in private funding for relief and recovery, of which \$173.5 million had been spent. (Note that participation in the Haiti Accountability Report is voluntary so not all members reported on the use of their funds. Therefore the total that InterAction can report on is less than the total raised by its members.) Both the IFRC and InterAction are unable to provide an update on the status of their pledge as their data collection efforts do not distinguish between relief and recovery.
